Message from the Principal

The Threads of Leadership that Tie Us Together

RECENTLY, THE WORLD CELEBRATED THE LIFE OF ONE OF THIS CENTURY'S GREATEST LEADERS, NELSON MANDELA. HE WAS A MAN WHO HAD THE CAPACITY AND DETERMINATION TO RALLY HIS COMMUNITY TO A COMMON CAUSE AND THE CHARACTER TO INSPIRE CONFIDENCE IN THOSE WHO FOLLOWED HIM.

At Brescia, we reflect daily on leadership on so many levels. Starting in our classrooms and rippling outwards to our offices, to our volunteer bodies and to the entire community around us, we consider the critical mission of building community through service. Through leadership.

A Leadership Journey “Up the hill”

IF YOU ASK ALUMNA MITRA KHADEMI ('95) WHY SHE HAS CHOSEN A PATH OF SERVICE LEADERSHIP, SHE WILL TELL YOU, “I LEARNED A LOT ABOUT WHAT LEADERSHIP MEANS DURING MY YEARS AS A STUDENT AT BRESCIA.” SINCE MOVING TO CANADA IN 1988 FROM TURKEY, BUT ORIGINALLY FROM IRAN, MITRA KNEW THAT BRESCIA WAS A FIT FOR HER THE DAY SHE “BEGAN HER JOURNEY UP THE HILL,” AS SHE RECALLS.

With English being her second language, she was told that she needed a Grade 13 English credit to enroll in university, something that she didn't have. After completing her TOEFL exam, she heard from a staff member at Western who asked, “Why don't you look at (applying to) one of the colleges?” Mitra would soon learn that the term “college” actually means community and that she would be attending a small university and still graduating with a Western degree. “I still remember the kind woman in the Registrar's Office at Brescia who met me the day I walked on campus, and in minutes said to me, ‘Of course you are accepted into Brescia, Mitra. Now we just need to enroll you in your courses.’ It was as simple as that. I will always remember faculty like Dr. Paul Barker, who never turned me down for any extra help, guidance, or support. I think that's one of the main reasons why I am who I am today.”

Mitra graduated from Brescia in 1995 with a Bachelor of Arts degree before going on to work for The Future Shop, Academy of Learning, and Citi Group, where she rose to management in each position. Today Mitra is the Divisional Director at Investors Group and oversees a team of 14 consultants and over \$17 million dollars in investments. “I love my job,” says Mitra. “The management part isn't about telling people what to do but instead about providing support, mentoring, and coaching.”

Mitra is also allowing Brescia students to benefit from her story of success. She has been a panel speaker for the last two years at the annual Career Symposium event, which is a chance for students to hear from alumnae about their career success stories. When asked why she chose to give back to Brescia, Mitra says, “It's not about the efforts that I put in. It's about the stories that I hear from students, like the single mother who attended the Symposium and thanked me at the end for helping to make her bursary possible.”

Mitra first became involved as an alumna at Brescia when she bought a ticket for a Breakfast for Bursaries event. This was a cause that she believed in. This was long before Mitra agreed to chair the event from 2007 until 2010. She now sits as Chair of Brescia's Foundation Development Committee, and is a Director on the Brescia Foundation Board.

Mitra offers the following advice to young alumnae and graduating students at Brescia: “As Cheryl Sandberg talks about, LEAN IN. Don't be afraid to take opportunities that come your way. And some day, when you find your reason, give back.”

Student Profile

Brooke Harrison – A lot to live up to

BROOKE, A 19-YEAR-OLD FIRST-YEAR BRESCIA STUDENT, IS CURRENTLY STUDYING COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT. SHE SPENT A YEAR STUDYING AT KING'S UNIVERSITY COLLEGE, BUT WAS ATTRACTED TO BRESCIA'S “HANDS-ON PROGRAMS” AND THE WARM AND FRIENDLY ATMOSPHERE.

Despite her age, Brooke has already accomplished more than what some people will in a lifetime. At only six years of age, Brooke was confronted with a situation that some adults would not be as equipped to handle. Her five-year-old cousin, Juliana, was diagnosed with leukemia. What started off as a small fundraising project, run out of her parents' dining room where Brooke collected recipes from friends and family and created a cookbook, turned into something much larger. Brooke describes how the project grew, and says, “For the first book it was local people, who became involved by donating recipes. When Juliana started her recovery, we decided to make cookbook number two. Along the way, there were more people I met who wanted to donate recipes and it became a much larger book.”

Brooke's passion for philanthropy has continued to be an ever-present aspect of her life. Some of her other charitable ventures include creating the first-ever Youth Advisory Council for the Phillip Aziz Hospice Care Centre in Toronto where she, along with some friends, put together Christmas drives and charity golf tournaments. The five golf tournaments alone raised \$150,000. Brooke was also the 2012 recipient of the *Violet Richardson Award* for Eastern Canada from the Soroptimist Club, an all women's professional group.

Brooke's most recent endeavour, referred to as the “Native Project,” helps to bridge the financial gap by providing isolated northern Aboriginal communities with new or used bedding, clothing, and books. With help from the North South Partnership for Children, as well as family and friends, she has raised approximately \$300,000 in supplies, including the cost of transportation and delivery to the remote area.

AFTER GRADUATION, ROSALIND ACHIEVED A POSITION WITH BMW'S HEAD OFFICE IN TORONTO, AS THE MINI BRAND MARKETING AND SALES INTERN. SHE HAS BEEN WITH BMW SINCE MARCH 2013, MANAGING BUDGETS AND ASSISTING IN VARIOUS MARKETING FUNCTIONS.

Rosalind says of her time at Brescia, “It helped me prepare for my career through hands-on business courses, where I was able to gain perspective and apply the theories that were instilled in me at Brescia.” Brescia also enabled Rosalind to take internships in various areas of marketing over her summer holidays. Rosalind’s managers focused on assisting her professional growth. She explains, “The best advice they gave me was to be proactive, to pursue my interests, and take initiative to learn more.”

Rosalind made the decision to attend Brescia in the middle of the summer, after applying to universities that weren’t the best fit for her. “Looking back, my experience was made worthwhile because of Brescia’s teaching style, small classes, and the welcoming environment.”

The staff at the Registrar’s Office at Brescia made a significant impact on Rosalind. They accommodated her needs with patience and care, while keeping her best interests in mind. Rosalind attributes much of that support to staff in the Registrar’s Office, such as Jessica Patterson and Wendy

Latimer. She also has great respect for her BMOS professor Melissa Jean, admiring her caring teaching style, and availability to her students.

ROSALIND DEFINES A LEADER AS, “SOMEONE WITH THE ABILITY TO INSPIRE PEOPLE, TO SEE A VISION, AND ENCOURAGE OTHERS TO WORK TOWARDS THE SAME THING.”

She emphasizes that everyone has the ability to inspire. Rosalind encourages current students to “persevere.” She goes on to say, “I encourage everyone to get involved by pursuing

your passions, taking opportunities, and not being afraid to lead.”

Rosalind looks for ways to give back to her community. Travel has provided her with extraordinary experiences for giving back, but she stresses the variety of accomplishments that can also occur in hometown settings.

“Although things may not always go as planned, see the positive in the opportunities and experiences you do have.” Rosalind, who hopes to pursue marketing on a global level, is most certainly driven to succeed.



Leading the way to a healthy heart

VANESSA HENRY ('13) HAS PROVEN THAT HARD WORK AND DETERMINATION HELP YOU TO ACHIEVE YOUR GOALS, DESPITE UNFORESEEN CHALLENGES ALONG THE WAY. VANESSA GRADUATED FROM BRESCIA IN 2013 WITH AN HONORS BSc IN NUTRITION AND DIETETICS, AND IS CURRENTLY COMPLETING A DIETITIAN INTERNSHIP WITH HAMILTON HEALTH SCIENCES CENTRE.

Vanessa chose to attend Brescia knowing that she would receive her Registered Dietitian designation through the Foods and Nutrition program and for the leadership possibilities

that were available to her. During her time at Brescia she became the President of the Student Human Ecology Association (SHEA), and played a pivotal role in organizing and running the Association of Canadian Home Economics Students Conference held last year. She was also involved in the promotion of the award-winning *Vegetarian's Complete Quinoa Cookbook*, to which many Foods and Nutrition students and alumnae have contributed. The book was awarded the “People’s Choice Award” at the Taste Canada Food Writing Awards in November 2013.

Vanessa will fondly remember two mentors during her educational journey, Ms. Lucy Mahood and Dr. June Matthews. Ms. Mahood, who Vanessa often turned to during her role as SHEA President, acted as her faculty advisor. “Vanessa’s determination, hard work, leadership and organizational skills combined with her supportive and collaborative nature made her a successful student and a leader during her time at Brescia,” Ms. Mahood states. Mahood also played a very supportive role during Vanessa’s difficult time losing her mother to leukemia in 2011. Dr. Matthews was someone Vanessa saw as extremely passionate about foods and nutrition and made her feel she could somehow change the world.

Vanessa describes herself as determined, resourceful, and an advocate, three things she largely took

from her time at Brescia. Her experience as SHEA President allowed her to build and hone skills that came into play during her internship and still help in her life after education. “I would definitely say at Brescia I learned about leadership, communication, and recognizing who’s struggling with their roles and who needs help making decisions,” Vanessa says. When asked what leadership means, Vanessa says, “It is supporting those around you and being other people’s strength when they need it and helping them to see the big picture.”

Vanessa remains active outside of her professional work while spending time with her horse, which she refers to as her “1100-pound child.” Additionally, she spends time volunteering with Operational Stress Injury Social Support (OSISS), a peer support program for families and ‘significant others’ of the military. Vanessa, along with Kyla Blackie ('14) and Krista Kolodziejczyk ('14), spearheaded a conference last September that was held at the London Convention Centre, and focused on post-traumatic stress disorder, supported by the OSISS group.

Upon completion of her Public Health and Food Services certifications, Vanessa hopes to work in an outpatient or inpatient clinical setting as a dietitian.

SHE CONCLUDES, “THE PROGRAM AT BRESCIA IS FANTASTIC. I AM PUTTING WHAT I LEARNED IN THE CLASSROOM TO USE IN MY PLACEMENT, AND FINDING A STYLE OF PRACTICE THAT WORKS FOR ME. BRESCIA REALLY HELPED ME WITH THAT.”



Volunteerism at its best

DONNA TEEPLE FIRST DISCOVERED BRESCIA AT A VERY SPECIAL BACCALAUREATE CEREMONY IN 2006. SHE WAS THERE TO SEE THE YOUNG WOMAN WHO IS NOW HER DAUGHTER-IN-LAW, BAILEY MYLES, WALK UP THE AISLE OF THE BASILICA TO CELEBRATE, WITH HER CLASSMATES, HER EDUCATION AT BRESCIA. JUST A YEAR LATER, DONNA ATTENDED A BREAKFAST FOR BURSARIES EVENT WITH VALERIE PRINGLE AS THE GUEST SPEAKER.

She was impressed by both events. But it wasn't until her good friend Dr. Marlene J. Le Ber, a Brescia Council of Trustees member, encouraged Donna to play a larger role at Brescia that she really fell in love with the place. Marlene, who chaired Brescia's Project and Facilities Planning (PFP) Committee and the Residence Committee, knew that these groups that were tasked with bringing the new residence and dining pavilion to fruition were missing one key player. They needed a designer who would bring an aesthetic eye to the new facility that was, at that time, a dream on paper but not yet a reality. Donna, who studied fashion design at Ryerson and who had a thriving design business of her own, was the ideal person to fill this gap. Luckily for Brescia she said "yes" to Marlene's invitation to join these two important committees.

That was four years ago and Donna has given unstintingly of her time ever since. She has also lent her own personal touch to the public spaces in Clare Hall, overseeing the purchase of *objets d'art*

and helping in the selection and planning of all things visual. Donna currently has her own design business, *Donna Teeple Interiors*.

The work on Clare Hall, for Donna, was a true labour of love as design is something that she has always been passionate about. She worked with partner Kim Blake at their company, *Stonewater Design*, for 13 years before opening her own company. She also finds the energy and time to give of her knowledge and expertise to *World Tailors* (www.worldtailors.ca). This organization develops leadership and confidence in women from all over the world through the creation of hand-crafted aprons and 'Market Bags', under the label World Cooks. Approximately 25 women, pictured above, from refugee camps in Nepal, from small villages in Africa, Bhutan, from cities in South Korea and Afghanistan, and islands such as Fiji, join together to learn from Donna and other mentors how to create and promote these beautiful products. Donna says of the miraculous transformation of these

women, "They come to us scared and apprehensive, many never having sewn before or spoken English in their lives. They blossom at *World Tailors*. We laugh and talk, and share and sew. We develop in these brave women a genuine independence and skills they can use in many different ways. For instance, they learn how to work on personal budgeting; they learn about the importance of body language; and they practise closing a sale."

For Donna, leadership begins with a vision and culminates in sharing that vision with others, bringing different talents together and enabling everyone with the freedom to do what they really love and the space to go beyond what they thought they could do. She also admires the leadership capabilities of Brescia's Principal, Dr. Colleen Hanycz, whom she describes as being inspirational.

Blazing a new path in leadership through athletic scholarships at Brescia

WHEN THÉRÈSE QUIGLEY TOOK A MCMASTER UNIVERSITY POST IN 1990, AS THE FIRST-EVER FEMALE DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS AND RECREATION IN ONTARIO, SHE BECAME A ROLE MODEL TO WOMEN IN CANADA. THROUGH HER ROLE SHE HAS LEARNED A THING OR TWO ABOUT THE CHALLENGES THAT WOMEN FACE IN BREAKING THE “GLASS CEILING.” SHE LEARNED TO BE BOLD AND TO PURSUE HER DREAMS FROM HER MOTHER, MARY, WHO ONCE CALLED BRESCIA HER HOME AS A STUDENT.

Thérèse remembers as a young girl coming to Brescia with her mom, Mary (Wintermeyer) Quigley ('41), numerous times over the years. Brescia stories from her aunts have been told and retold at family gatherings for generations – stories not held in archives or journals but in the hearts and memories of her mother, her aunts, and their Brescia friends.

Thérèse came back to her London roots in 2009, when she assumed the role of Director of Sports and Recreation Services at Western. She has been a game-changer, literally, ever since. She had a vision of engaging Western alumni on a global level through the Internet. Thérèse mentored and supported her staff, in the development and growth of Mustang

TV, which has seen significant gains over the past five years, with games and alumni events broadcast around the world, and has a steadily growing viewership. Thérèse is also proud to have played a strong role in advocating at the provincial and national level on a gender equity policy that has been adopted by the majority of universities in Canada.

On arriving at Western, she was very encouraged to see the strong position Western has adopted with regard to gender equity in Athletic Financial Awards. She continues to champion and educate others about the importance of this initiative, not only for the Western community but for women in athletics around the world.

Wanting to do something personally to encourage more students to choose sports while at Western, Thérèse was inspired to create a new five-year scholarship at Brescia called the Mary and Malachy Quigley Scholarship, named after her late parents. Thérèse says that

“BRESCIA IS A NATURAL PLACE FOR FEMALE STUDENT ATHLETES WHO WANT A SMALLER LEARNING ENVIRONMENT. STUDENT ATHLETES OFTEN DON'T FIT INTO THE TYPICAL 'NEEDS-BASED' FORMULAS.

Often the personal costs in training and competition, while representing the university, do not qualify as eligible expenses. This scholarship will help reduce the financial hardships and barriers to being involved in sports at the university level.”

With this scholarship, Thérèse is following a long line of family members who have been strong supporters of Brescia over the years. Mary was one of five sisters who attended Brescia, all of whom were members of Brescia's famous Wintermeyer family. Thérèse's grandparents established the Wintermeyer Scholarship through a gift in their will in 1974. The Mary and Malachy Quigley Scholarship is a testament to Thérèse's strong Brescia connection, and will continue a long legacy of bold Wintermeyer women. Through Thérèse's gift, and through the leadership that she and her family have shown, Brescia will continue to be influenced by the women of our past while it continues to lead female education into the future.

Be happy and play hard: Lois (Greening) Gordon celebrates 65 years

IF LOIS (GREENING) GORDON ('48) HAD ONE PIECE OF ADVICE TO GIVE TO STUDENTS WALKING THE HALLS OF BRESCIA TODAY, SHE SAYS IT WOULD BE: “BE HAPPY AND PLAY HARD.” IT IS A TIMELESS PIECE OF ADVICE FOR STUDENTS AND BRESCIA GRADUATES ACROSS ALL GENERATIONS. AND IT IS A PHILOSOPHY THAT STILL RESONATES IN HER LIFE AT 87 YEARS YOUNG.

Lois was adamant that she didn't want to miss her 65th anniversary at Brescia and the opportunity to reconnect with her classmates Gerry (Zink) Payne and Marie (Johnson) Hardy this past fall. The 400-kilometre journey to Brescia, which she made with the help of her son John and daughter Mary, was more than worth it. She enthuses, “My darling granddaughter Meg asked

to go with us and that made me very happy. I wanted Mary and Meg to see the beautiful Chapel, and some of the rooms where we had classes. It was a delightful day.”

Lois was born and raised in London, Ontario, where her parents owned and operated a grocery store on Dundas Street. Her father was from Birmingham, England, and her mother, from London, Ontario. Lois was an only child and lived off-campus with her parents and remembers her dad dropping her off, and picking her up daily. She also recalls taking classes at Western. Back then there wasn't a shuttle bus, so she would walk to Brescia from Western and, on occasion, she would borrow her friend Helen (Crummer) Clark's car, nicknamed the “Leaping Lena,” and drive the distance to Western.

When Lois graduated in 1948 with her Baccalaureate in Arts, Convocation Day was particularly memorable for her because of the gift she received from Mother St. James. Mother St. James painted a small picture of Brescia Hall (now Ursuline Hall) for each graduate. And each painting was unique. After 65 years this small painting, now framed, still hangs on Lois's wall.

Lois says she will take her own advice, and will be back on the Brescia hill in five years for her 70th anniversary. She plans to play hard for many more years to come.





Get to know Sister Mary Frances Dorschell

When did you graduate from Brescia and with what degree?

I graduated from Brescia in 1963, with a three-year BA in Latin and History.

What have you been doing since then, specifically at Brescia and within the Ursuline community?

Before returning to Brescia in 1982, I taught high school at “The Pines”

in Chatham for several years. At that time I taught mostly English, Spanish, and Geography but with insufficient background to teach these subjects. In order to improve my qualifications to teach English and Spanish, I took evening classes in English from the University of Windsor for several years and in the summers I travelled to Mexico City to earn a Master’s in Spanish at the Universidad Iberoamericana. At the same time I started teaching Grades Nine and Ten French,

which meant I needed to become qualified to teach French. This led me to spend summers studying at the University of Toronto and Laval University. My community then asked me to move to Brescia to prepare to teach here. At first I was Dean of Students, which meant I was in charge of the Residence; however, the idea was that I would ultimately assume the position of Chair of Modern Languages. In order to do so, I needed a PhD in French. While

working full time, I managed to complete my Honours degree in French Language and Literature in three years, my Master’s in two, and my PhD in five. Upon completion of my PhD from Western, I was appointed Chair of Modern Languages and have been teaching French ever since.

Why did you choose to stay and teach at Brescia?

I really love teaching. I belong to a religious community and am now the last of the Ursuline Sisters teaching and living here at Brescia.

Was there a particular memory from your time here that stays with you?

I don’t have any memory in particular, but, in general, I cherish the interaction with the students. I very much love getting students involved in class discussions on the works we are studying and also in just talking with them outside of class.

How do you feel about being the only Ursuline Sister living at Brescia?

It is quite a different experience from being a member of a community of several sisters. Even though I miss having other Ursulines here at Brescia, I am very happy to be able to have more contact with the students. There is a group that meets with me every evening to have supper together. We talk about anything and everything, both silly and serious. The students themselves all say that we are like a family. I believe it is what St. Angela, the

foundress of the Ursulines, had in mind as we can see from pictures we have of her sitting in the midst of a group of women.

Can you tell us a little bit about your feelings when your name was announced as the winner of the Living Leadership Award?

I wasn’t expecting it at all. I felt deeply honoured. It was a humbling experience too when I think about it. There are many people here at Brescia who are deserving of the award. I was quite touched by the nice things that people said; so many told me how happy they were for me and that they were glad I received the award.

What advice would you give to Brescia alumnae and students who want to lead boldly?

Leadership means being a courageous woman, knowing what your convictions are, knowing what you have learned

and how to live accordingly. I recommend that you simply go forward and consider the needs of others before your own.

How do you define leadership?

For me the term “leadership” means being a “servant leader,” which implies observing the needs of others and doing what I can to help them. Montaigne, a French author of the Renaissance period, used to ask himself two questions: “Qui suis-je?” (“Who am I?”) and “Qu’est-ce que je dois faire?” (“What must I do?”). I think the answers to these two questions describe what a leader should be: a human being who has a responsibility to other human beings. As St. Angela has taught us, we must help others, always doing all we can to provide a better life for them.

What three words best describe you?

Education, prayer, and people.

New Beyond the Classroom Fund builds leadership and global citizens.

BRESCIA GRADUATES OF THE EARLY YEARS MAY REMEMBER THE UNIVERSITY DAYS WHEN LEARNING PRIMARILY HAPPENED IN THE CLASSROOM. TODAY, EXPERIENTIAL LEARNING, OR LEARNING BY DOING, IS GAINING TRACTION AND BECOMING INCREASINGLY IMPORTANT.

According to a survey by the Canadian Bureau for International Education, 91% of employers say they value job candidates with international experience because it develops cross-cultural understanding. Approximately 50% said they would hire a candidate with study-abroad experience over one without – all else being equal.

Unfortunately, only 50% of undergraduates obtain a co-op, internship or community service experience during their university studies, and only 13% of bachelor's students have international study experiences by the time they graduate.

We have work to do. Brescia is taking a bold step to address this gap through the creation of the Beyond the Classroom Fund. You may have read about Brescia student Tess Widdifield, who spent a month in Joplin, Missouri where she worked with children affected by a powerful tornado. Not only did she make a difference in the children's lives, she also gained experience, skills, and knowledge that will be invaluable as she builds her career in community development.



Tess inspired us to create the Beyond the Classroom fund. The fall 2013 fundraising campaign raised \$16,212 for highest priority needs, bursaries, and other programs. She says that her son, an intelligent and resilient 16 year-old, "talks about university or college as an option, when he never did before. He sees me doing homework and learning and is inspired by my experience." The cycle is shifting because of this bursary.

Sr. Dolores Kuntz: From Professor to Principal

SR. DOLORES KUNTZ HELD A NUMBER OF TITLES AND POSITIONS IN HER LIFETIME, DEDICATING NEARLY FIVE DECADES TO THE BRESCIA COMMUNITY. SR. DOLORES TAUGHT ECONOMICS AND PSYCHOLOGY FROM 1959 TO 1994. ALSO DURING THIS TIME, FROM 1959-1965, SR. DOLORES SERVED AS A RESIDENCE DON, LIVING ON THE FLOOR WITH THE YOUNG WOMEN ATTENDING BRESCIA.

In 1977, Sr. Dolores was appointed Principal and Academic Dean, which saw her sitting on various committees and councils around the College, including Faculty Council, Students' Council, and the Alumnae Board, to name a few.

In 1994, due to the heavy demands of her time, Sr. Dolores retired from teaching to dedicate herself full-time to her responsibility as Principal and Academic Dean at Brescia. While in this position, Sr. Dolores was described as having a consultative leadership style, showing interest in recruitment, and playing a central role in the creation of Brescia's first web site in 1996.

After her retirement as Principal and Academic Dean in 1999, Sr. Dolores continued to live in residence while serving as Brescia's System Support Specialist for an additional eight years until her final retirement in 2008. In 2001, a tree was planted in her honour to celebrate her 22 years of service as Brescia's Principal.

Since her 2008 retirement, Sr. Dolores spends her time at Villa Angela, enjoying herself in the company of fellow retired Ursuline Sisters.

Tisha Peters-Weekes (pictured left) and Kendall Beselaere (pictured right) are third-year Brescia students and both hold positions on the executive of Pink Ties, a student business management club that provides guidance, mentoring, and workshops to help female students begin to prepare for their careers in the business profession. Anne Rubino (pictured centre), also a member of the Pink Ties executive, and currently sitting as President of the club, is studying in her last year at Huron University College.

Tisha is currently on exchange at Brescia from St. Michael Barbados, at the University of the West Indies Cave Hill, where she is studying consumer behaviour and sociology at Brescia. She first heard about the only women's university in Canada through an advertisement she saw while living in Barbados with her husband and her two children. Tisha says of her decision to move her family to Canada so she could attend Brescia, "I could tell from meeting Marianne Simm (Registrar and Director of Student Affairs), and Jennifer Coghlin (Associate Registrar), that Brescia would provide a warm and supporting atmosphere. When I arrived, my experience was precisely that and I felt welcomed from the moment I was greeted at the airport by Christina Lord (Co-ordinator, International Student Program). The small community feel at Brescia was a great fit for me."

For Kendall, who is working on a double major in accounting and leadership marketing, it was a friend from home who spoke about Brescia and it wasn't long before Kendall's plans to attend Western had changed to applying to, and accepting, an offer from Brescia. "It just felt more like home," says Kendall. "The learning is so hands-on here and the discussions in class are so practical; it just works."

Even Anne, who takes courses at Brescia, says, "Brescia students are so friendly; they will be the ones to start a

conversation on the bus or on the first day of class. It's such a great place to be a part of."

All three women have become close friends through their leadership work and shared passion for Pink Ties, which Anne says "is meant to enhance professional development skills." Kendall adds,

Professor Melissa Jean is the faculty advisor for Pink Ties, and all three women will agree that Melissa is a role model for students. Says Anne, "She is a kind and honest professor, whose quiet quality encourages students to excel in her classes." Other faculty members who have had a positive influence on the young women include Professor Tony Francolini, who Kendall says, "is always willing to help, one-on-one,

in a conversational manner, and Professor Colleen Sharen, who Tisha says she has enjoyed getting to know. "Professor Sharen is so great. She is someone who teaches us through real-life case studies in the marketing world and has helped us prepare for what to expect in the business world."

Tisha, Anne, and Kendall have high hopes for their futures. Anne hopes to apply to legal, or business administration. Tisha plans on pursuing a career in human resources and hopes to return to Canada after completing her degree. "My children love it here. They love their school and they especially love all of the snow." Kendall plans to go on to do post-graduate studies, in the area of corporate communications and public relations.
