


How to Find Journal Articles in Omni


1. Begin your search on the Advanced Search page ([Bit.ly/OmniAdvanced](https://bit.ly/OmniAdvanced))



In South Asia, Nepal has the lowest per capita income, highest dependence of population on agriculture and second highest poverty rate. At the same time, Nepal has the lowest average tariffs in South Asia and has taken several steps to downsize its public food distribution system and remove a host of agricultural subsidies. Citation Trail Method

1. Citation trails can be used to find related articles and track the discourse surrounding a research topic in a field of study. Omni links citations and references and makes these accessible through the search results for any journal article



A. Click on the “Find sources citing this” button in any article result to see articles that reference the original article

B. Click on the “Find sources cited in this” in any article result to see articles that were referenced by the original article
